Pantomime & Sleeping Beauty

"Pantomime is no longer what it used to be. They have had their day," said a press report in 1846.

Contrary to this pantomime has never been more popular and for many of us Christmas would not be Christmas without it; it was probably the place most of us first discovered the magic of theatre.

It's pantomime's unique fusion of eccentricity, ambiguity and absurdity that tells us so much about our national identity and is quintessentially British: as British as Earl Grey tea or a good Indian curry.

Pantomime as we know it today has its roots in ancient Greek mythology and their traditional tales of comedy and tragedy and comes to us through the filter and additions of Italian Commedia dell'arte, French touring theatre and good, old fashioned British Music Hall amongst others.

The first recorded use of the Anglicised word 'Pantomime' (from the Greek meaning 'we can act anything') comes from during the seventeenth century and the most famous of all pantomime performers is Joseph Grimaldi (1778-1837) known as the Prince of Clowns. It is his influence on Pantomime and that of John Rich (1692-1761) an actor and director and, one-time local resident, David Garrick (1717-1779) that created the style of pantomime that is still performed today.

The top five stories to be performed as pantomimes for the last few years are *Aladdin, Dick Whittington, Cinderella, Snow White* and *Sleeping Beauty*.

Charles Perrault (1628-1703) wrote the version of *Sleeping Beauty*, derived from pre-existing folk tales, that is best known today and the story is told every year through pantomime performances, storybooks, ballets and films – like the animated Disney classic from 1959.

Some folklorists believe the basic elements of the *Sleeping Beauty* story can be interpreted as a nature allegory: the princess represents nature, the wicked fairy is Winter (her name in our pantomime this evening), who puts the Court to sleep with pricks of frost until the Prince cuts away the brambles with his sword (a sunbeam) to allow the Sun to awaken sleeping nature.

It is our take of his version of this classic tale, with a few additions from other fairy stories, that we present for you this evening...

Sleeping Beauty

- a modern, old fashioned pantomime for children of all ages

Hello and welcome children both young and old to our production of *Sleeping Beauty* – this year's Christmas show for Teddington Theatre Club.

As I write this (a few weeks ago) the news is full of awful things and I am reminded of the importance of being able to escape into another world, albeit just for a couple of hours, a world like that of Pantomime, and that there is still good, kindness and fun.

Directing any show is always an adventure and I can honestly say I've never had more fun than with this Pantomime. My thanks go to our great cast and crew who have helped make it a pleasure from the very start to right now.


