

Roger Smith - Chesterman

After joining TTC in 1972 Roger first played Duncan in 'the Scottish Play'. He directed a studio production Escurial in 1975 and his first major production, Habeus Corpus in 1977. Subsequent directorial highlights have included The Anniversary, Alphabetical Order and Darkness at Noon (the last two both Swan Award winners) Waiting in the Wings and TTC's final productions at both Hampton Court (Dead of Night) and at Vera Fletcher Hall (They Came to a City). He has also directed a number of plays at HHP including

most recently *Present Laughter*. TTC acting credits include Edmund in *The Exorcism*, Friar Laurence in *Romeo and Juliet*, Gerado in *Death and The Maiden*, Badger in *Wind in the Willows*, Geoffrey in *Absurd Person Singular*, Lord Augustus in *Lady Windermere's Fan*, Talbot in *Mary Stewart* and most recently as Arthur in Patrick Adams' new play competition winner, 99%.



**Graham Titcombe** – Aubrey Henry Maitland Allington

This is Graham's sixth appearance at TTC. He was last seen in a cell, chained up as a hostage in the Lebanon in *Someone Who'll Watch Over Me*. However, he seems to play butlers quite a lot, having done so in two of his other four plays (*The Importance of Being Earnest* and *The Drowsy Chaperone*), and so he is delighted that *Tons of Money* has elevated him to a status where he now has a butler of his own, even if it is Sprules!

## **Tons of Money**

I first came across the Alan Ayckbourn adaptation of *Tons of Money* when I saw the fantastic National Theatre production back in 1987! I still have vivid memories of that performance (especially the traysbusiness) with a cast which included Sir Michael Gambon and the much-missed Diane Bull as Sprules and Simpson .

I knew the series of Aldwych Farces by Ben Travers, *Rookery Nook*, *Thark* etc but did not know of this particular play which is regarded as the first of them - even though it actually played at The Shaftesbury Theatre (in 1922). That first production brought together the famous Aldwych Farce Team - Tom Walls, Ralph Lynn, Mary Brough and Robertson Hare. The original cast also featured Yvonne Arnaud in the pivotal role of Louise – the only one of the farces where the plot was driven by a female character. Tom Walls, producer/ director cannily played the scene stealing role of Henery, while Ralph Lynn was a natural for Aubrey.

The play was written by Will Evans and Arthur Valentine (father of Fanny Craddock!) but there is no real doubt that Walls and Lynn and their team of talented farceurs put their imprint on the play and it is difficult to know how much of the Evans and Valentine script actually made it to the stage. The play became a favourite with repertory companies and when Ayckbourn came to adapt it, he changed very little of the dialogue apart from word-gags and business that would not be thought funny by a nineteen eighties audience.

It has been a great script to work on and I very much hope that we send you home fully entertained.

### Alan Ayckbourn

Sir Alan Ayckbourn CBE is a prolific English playwright. He has written and produced more than seventy full-length plays in Scarborough and London and was, between 1972 and 2009, the artistic director of the Stephen Joseph Theatre in Scarborough, where all but four of his plays have received their first performance. More than forty have subsequently been produced in the West End, at the National Theatre or by the Royal Shakespeare Company since his first hit Relatively Speaking opened at the Duke of York's Theatre in 1967. Major successes include Absurd Person Singular, The Norman Conquests trilogy, Bedroom Farce, Just Between Ourselves, A Chorus of Disapproval, Woman in Mind, A Small Family Business, Man Of The Moment, House & Garden and Private Fears in Public Places. His plays have won numerous awards, including seven London Evening Standard Awards. They have been translated into over thirty five languages and are performed on stage and television throughout the world. Ten of his plays have been staged on Broadway, attracting two Tony nominations, and a Tony award.

#### Will Evans and Arthur Valentine

*Tons of Money* is a farcical play by British writers Will Evans and Arthur Valentine. It was first performed in April 1922 at the Shaftesbury Theatre and ran for nearly two years. Its great success led to the series of long-running Aldwych farces. Alan Ayckbourn updated and directed the play in 1986 in a revival by the National Theatre starring Michael Gambon and Simon Cadell.

#### Mair Graham - Director

Mair is delighted to be back directing for TTC and can't believe it is seven years since her last show here. Previous productions for TTC at the Hampton Hill Playhouse include *Ring Round the Moon, Brighton Beach Memoirs* (Swan Nomination), and *Charley's Aunt*. She has directed for Richmond Shakespeare Society where her productions include *Dancing at Lughnasa, Under Milkwood, The Seagull* (Swan Award), *See How They Run* (Swan Nomination), and most recently *Little Gem*.

#### **Asha Gill** – Assistant Director


