ALTHOUGH Noel Coward wrote "I cannot remember, the house where I was born", he did recall that it was in Waldegrave Road, Teddington, and now number 131 will be identified by an English Heritage plaque as the official birthplace of this prodigiously talented man.

And the company of eleven, which should have been twelve, directed with

precision by Jon Scarrott, musically directed by Catherine Scarrott, plus Gordon Edwards and Jessica Winterstein, made it an affectionate and memorable tribute.

In spite of Jen Lacey's absence due to an accident, the other five women and six men in the cast took over her numbers and provided an almost seamless production.

Without trying to emulate the Master, Steve Bentley got his essence, suavely achieving a laconic style in delivering his poetry and prose, with an admirable vocal dexterity in the tongue-twisting lyrics of songs like "Nina".

At her considerable best in bluesy numbers, Wendy Bedford's mellow, velvety tones were a delight in "Twentieth Century Blues" and "Mad About the Boy" and accompanied by the versatile Edward Jeoffroy, she made an hilarious "Derby & Joan".

Whether tap dancing, doing the links, or singing, Joe Early seemed perfectly at home in the Coward style and Matt Hilliard showed his acting abilities as a pretentious, aspiring young writer in a scene with Steve from "Present Laughter".

But ultimately this well directed and choreographed show is a group achievement which sent the appreciative Saturday audience happy into the night.

The theatre club is moving into a new home on Hampton Hill High Street next spring and has only three or four production left at its current base.

A cast of 12 actors and singers will be putting on the show for a week long run.

Theatre club appeal coordinator, Eric Yardley, said: "They have been rehearsing very hard. They are a very talented company with some fine singers.

More than £750,000 was raised in four years to construct the new theatre, which should be ready next spring.

A further £175,000 needs to be raised to fit out the theatre, to be called the Hampton Hill Playhouse.

Some of that money has already been pledged by businesses, charities and individuals, but more is needed.

Cowardy Custard begins its eight day

Musical Custard

This week's Teddington Theatre Club revival of Cowardy Custard is a family occasion for director Jon Scarrott. His wife Sue is behind the scenes as prompt, the colourful art-deco setting is designed by son Sam, and daughter Catherine is at the keyboard in the Angel niche to provide the reassuringly familiar melodies.

At the Mermaid in 1972 this dazzling anthology of the life and work of Noel Coward was the very irst compilation musical, a genre ich now fills half the theatres endon. But its begetter Wendy alised that, with Coward, is mattered as much if not he music.

Happily TTC's company of 11 (there should have been a dozen but for a last minute accident) is led by Stephen Bentley who brings an Oscarish vocal authority to the text. Witness his superb rendering of the young Noel's recollections of auditions for Christmas shows, moments in an empty theatre, and a powerful scene from Present Laughter with Matthew Hilliard as the tiresome tyro Roland Maule and Anne Low as the secretary.

Mandy Stenhouse, deputising at the last moment, is a great deal

funnier in Marvellous Party than of Mad About The Boy. And her material. In particular, she is deliciously disdainful in the Spinning Wheel song, a char who's Mad About The Boy and an "absolute fizzer" as she spurns Jim Tickle in favour of Edward Jeoffroy in the You Were There scene.

Daisy Hughes is amusingly subtle as the busy young Alice, whose activities down a country lane are wryly carolled by Joe Early; willowy Lois Jones comes into her own as the restless Poor Little Rich Girl; and Miles Hawkins gives winning support throughout the evening.

Unquestioned musical star of the show is Wendy Bedford in magnifi-cent bluesy form in the final chorus is absolutely unmissable in a finitive version of Darby and Jo brilliantly paired with the wi Mr Jeoffroy as Bronxville wrinklie
